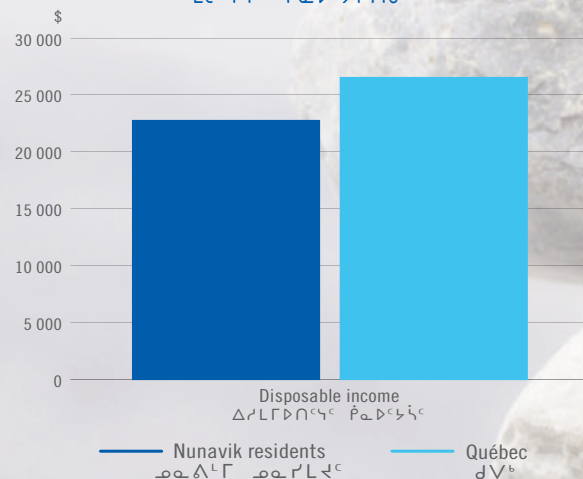

More than half of all work income in Nunavik in 2012 was not paid to regional residents. This high proportion is due in large part to the significant use in key sectors of the Nunavik economy of workers who reside outside the region.

The purpose of the study was to create a snapshot of the economy in Nunavik. Although essential, no similar information is available from any other source.

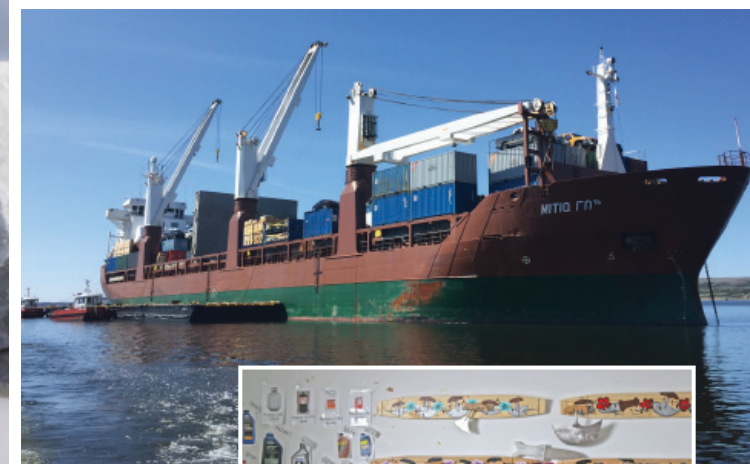

SIGNIFICANT ECONOMIC GROWTH IN NUNAVIK

In 2012, the economy in Nunavik totalled \$839 million. The size of the economy more than doubled between 2003 and 2012. This growth is proportionally greater than the growth in the Québec economy. This is one of the highlights of the *Economic Portrait of Nunavik 2012*, a study produced under the Nunivaat – Nunavik Statistics Program.
