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
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HAIR ON ABORIGINAL CONDITION

Income Directed Outside the Region

More than half of all work income in Nunavik in 2012 was not paid to regional residents. This high proportion is due in large part to the significant use in key sectors of the Nunavik economy of workers who reside outside the region.

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SIGNIFICANT ECONOMIC GROWTH **IN NUNAVIK**

In 2012, the economy in Nunavik totalled \$839 million. The size of the economy more than doubled between 2003 and 2012. This growth is proportionally greater than the growth in the Québec economy. This is one of the highlights of the Economic Portrait of Nunavik 2012, a study produced under the Nunivaat - Nunavik Statistics Program.



Government expenditures

Public administration continued in 2012 to play a core role in regional economic activity. Government expenditures represented 53% of all economic activity when the mining sector is excluded, and 32% when the mining sector is considered.

Government expenditures per capita are almost four times greater in Nunavik than in the whole of Québec. The provincial government is responsible for almost half of all public expenditures in Nunavik.

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Mining Sector

While government expenditures have more than doubled since 2003, growth in the mining sector has been much greater still. The value of the mining sector in 2012 was eight times greater than in 2003. In 2012, the sector represented more than 40% of all economic activity in Nunavik.






Personal Income

PERSONAL INCOME

Inuit received close to 70% of the income paid to regional residents, while non-Inuit received roughly 30%. Personal disposable income per capita is nonetheless lower for Inuit residents compared with non-Inuit residents and with Québec as a whole.
